No visit to Singapore is complete with a taste of some of the following local delicacies:

CHILLI CRAB

One of Singapore's most well-known signature dishes, made by frying crabs in a fragrant red sauce.

HOKKIEN PRAWN MEE

A combination of yellow and white noodles fried with seafood and lard.

HAINANESE CHICKEN RICE

Often known a Singapore's national dish, this is a favourite among locals and tourists alike.

FRIED RADISH CAKE

A snack made with steamed rice flour and white radish, fried with egg and garnished with spring onions.

FISH HEAD CURRY

A Singaporean dish of Ikan Merah (red snapper fish), cooked in a spicy-hot curry with vegetables.

CHAR KWAY TEOW

Translating to "stir-fried ricecake strips", this is a popular noodle dish around the Southeast Asian region.

ROTI PRATA

An Indian dish that is similar to a pancake, which is eaten with curry or sugar.

BAK KUT TEH

A soup made with pork ribs and spices, also called "Meat Bone

SENTOSA ISLAND

Sentosa Island is a popular island resort in Singapore, with attractions like a 2-km long sheltered beach, Fort Siloso, two golf courses, 14 hotels, and the Resorts World Sentosa. Resorts World Sentosa Singapore is the first ever integrated resort on Sentosa Island, which includes highly anticipated and exciting new attractions such as Universal Studios Singapore[™] and FestiveWalk[™], and the yet to open Marine Life Park™.

GETTING THERE

The island is accessible by the Sentosa Express monorail, which can be boarded at the Vivo City Shopping Mall. It can also be reached by Cable Car, which originates from Mount Faber and passes through HarbourFront en route to its final destination at Imbiah lookout. Visitors can also access the island via the Sentosa Boardwalk, which is a leisurely stroll from VivoCity Shopping Mall's waterfront promenade, made easy by two-way canopy-covered travellators. The Sentosa Boardwalk is a new and exciting dimension of the Sentosa Experience, which enhances the seamless accessibility and connectivity between the island and the mainland.

HAWKER CENTRES

These cooked food centres are open-air complexes that house a variety of inexpensive food stalls. Typically found in city centres, they sprang up following rapid urbanization in the 1950s and 1960s, in part to help address the problem of unhygienic food preparation by unlicensed street hawkers. In Singapore, hawker centres are losing popularity due to growing affluenc, and many are being replaced by indoor, air-conditioned food courts.
